Happy Anniversary!



This month we celebrate 90 years of the Methodist Society in the Garden City. A wonderful and very distinguished history. Not at times without its difficulties, anxieties and fears for the future. And yet, a faithful group of men and women have down the years worked faithfully and persistently to make sure of the continuance of that society for those who would come after them. Surely in this faithfulness and persistence we have seen something of God's mission for the world being fulfilled.

I say this because you have concentrated on the things that would please the heart of God. You have concentrated on the faithful offering of worship to God, in the richness and fullness of your different traditions. You have concentrated on the faithful preaching and hearing of the Scriptures, by the different ministers and local preachers who have been with you. You have concentrated on making yourselves accessible to those who would come your way, to be your members or friends for a short time or for a lifetime. Perhaps most importantly you have concentrated on making your buildings a place of hospitality in the Garden City to those who will never come to join you. In so doing you may well have entertained angels unawares. It is, if I may say so, in this generous and self-sacrificing offering of hospitality to the stranger and the outsider that you most fully mirror the life and work of Jesus of Nazareth. So, on behalf of my Episcopalian brothers and sisters, I say "Happy Anniversary" to you Methodists.



And we are not without our anniversaries on the Episcopalian side of the pitch either (not that we're altogether playing for different teams!). Many of you will recall how in late January 1996, after a rather sticky patch in the long and sometimes undistinguished history of Episcopalianism in Rosyth, our wee congregation was offered the use of the church buildings for our worship and community life by Rev Malcolm Trew. That is now fully ten years ago and much has changed and developed with us, and no doubt with you in these last years. Of course, it is not for me to say whether in welcoming us Episcopalians you have entertained angels unawares!

So, like as all times of anniversary, I say with all my heart and soul – "Thank-you Methodists for having us with you. Our love for you remains undiminished with the passing of the years. Indeed it grows and develops into a mature love as we continue to move forward together in partnership."

And at this time of anniversary for both congregations, it is particularly fitting that we are entering a new phase of our congregational life and development with our *Continuing Congregational Development* (CCD) programme. This programme began on 8 February and will see us once again working together to see what needs to be done in order to ensure that there is a great sense of divine purpose and encouragement for our work, in order to ensure that the Methodist Society reaches its glorious Centenary and that we Episcopalians may have the honour of saying in a decades time that we have been sharing with you for twenty years. You will be hearing more about the CCD programme, so please look out for information about where the programme will take us.

Albert Schweitzer once said: "I don't know what your destiny will be but one thing I do know: the only ones among you who will be really happy are those who have sought and found how to serve." Perhaps at this happy time as we look back, as well as forwards, we may know the truth of this for ourselves and for our homes and for our congregations.

Those who have not completed a Gift Aid declaration should complete the section on the envelope. If you need any further explanation please speak to John Cowie.

## The Scout Group

Having had a successful year with full programmes and growing membership in almost all the Sections, we were sad when two of our Leaders (Paul Ward and Alex Mitchell) resigned at the turn of the year. As a result, the Cub and Scout Sections now have only one dedicated adult leader each and both Sections are highly dependent upon the support and commitment given by some of our Explorer Scouts who have recently completed their Young Leader training. We have, however, been glad to welcome one new leader into the Explorer Scout Section – which is just as well considering the non-stop activity programme that they run throughout the year.

The high points in the Scout Group this year have undoubtedly been the award of the Silver Acorn by the Scout Association to our Cub Leader Martin Rogers, and Chief Scout's Awards to one of our Scouts, to five Explorer Scouts and to seven Cubs. These awards are all amongst the highest that can be gained in the Scout Movement and are worthy of being mentioned here, not only as evidence of the commitment and enthusiasm of our Scouts and Leaders but also as a testimony to the standard of youth work sustained by the church.







Wouldn't it be great if more of our church members or their families or friends could help out at our weekly meetings and activities! We are desperately looking out for new people, both men and women, to come along and help with the Cub and Scout Sections. So if anyone knows of someone who might be able to help on a Tuesday or Friday evening, please let me know.

The **Explorer Scout** programme this year makes you feel tired just reading it! They went off to an International Scout Camp in Essex last August; they have twice been abroad - to Belgium and France; they are active members of a conservation group in Fife, they put on a two-hour gangshow in the church, and they went on a three day walking expedition in central Scotland, not to mention their "routine" programme of camping, water-skiing, snow skiing, wind-carting, and kayaking.

The **Scout** troop has maintained a full programme throughout the year and did well in some of the competitions that it entered. The Scouts won the annual safety competition and came second in the indoor scouting skills competition. Their summer camp was held at Bonaly by the Pentland Hills and they held several week-end camps throughout the spring, summer and autumn months.

The number of boys in the **Cubs** is still about the most that we have had for a long time - despite the Pack being so short of Leaders! Week-end camps, and hikes with sleep-overs at the Church, continue to feature in their programme. A strong focus on training through the Cub Challenge Badge scheme is evident by the fine display of badges on uniforms and the fact that a good number of boys attain the highest Cub award, the Chief Scout's Silver Award.

This year has seen huge changes in numbers attending **Beaver** meetings. The year started with a full colony of over twenty, and then fell back to about half that number when so many boys went up to the Cubs. New-comers swelled the group to 19 and now, with more boys only recently moving on into the Cubs they are down to 14 and so have lots of space for more to join. The Beavers programme is all about having fun and discovering new things, so the weekly meetings are full of games, handicraft activities, trying experiments, and learning about other people and places. Every now and then the Beavers take up a fund-raising challenge to raise money for a children's charity. Last year they raised money for "Children with Leukaemia".

Beaver, Cub and Scout meetings continue to take place at the usual times: Beavers (ages 6-8) and Cubs (ages  $8-10^1/_2$ ) meet in the Church hall on Tuesday evenings at 5.30 and 6.30pm respectively and the Scouts (ages  $10^1/_2$ -14) and Explorer Scouts (14 – 18) meet on Fridays at 7pm.

Ten Glorious Years - St Margaret's, Rosyth

This short reminiscence is based very closely on a sermon preached by Rev Dr David Campbell on 14 January 2006 to commemorate the 10th Anniversary of St Margaret's Church, Rosyth.

Ten glorious years - that's how long the church of St Margaret of Scotland has been sharing these buildings with our friends of Rosyth Methodist Church. In this year of anniversaries, notably the 90th Anniversary of Methodism in Rosyth, that very fact is something worth celebrating,

particularly as it gives us a chance to look back on what the past has brought us. And as we do, we look back on the twin strands of Episcopalian and Anglican Church history in this community.

Episcopalians have worshipped in Rosyth since 1917, when a wee congregation gathered in a temporary building dedicated on 29 July 1917 to St Andrew and St George.






Nine years later the church of St Andrew and St George was built in Kings Place and consecrated in February 1926. After many a long and dedicated day of struggle, the church of St Andrew and St George became an incumbency in 1961, that is, it had a full-time priest. Various linkages with the churches in Inverkeithing and Lochgelly resulted in all three charges becoming part of the West Fife Team in 1986. Sadly the great, cathedralesque church was closed on 24 August 1986 and with it many of the hopes of the faithful people who had sustained it were dashed. It had lasted only 60

years. Worship continued for four years in the Salvation Army Hall in Backmarch Road, until the sad day in 1990 when the charge finally closed.

Anglicans associated with the Royal Navy and the Dockyard in Rosyth – not to be confused with Episcopalians, though in truth there is little difference, even though this was indeed an outpost of "the English church"! – have been in Rosyth since construction of the dockyard began in 1909. In about 1917, part of the outbuildings of Orchardhead Farm were converted into a temporary Church for the St Margaret's Church of England Congregation. After victory was won in the Great War the fleet base and dockyard was placed on a care and maintenance basis in 1925. The Church was closed and the congregation merged with the St Andrew & St George Episcopal Church congregation. The Dockyard re-opened in 1938 bringing a great influx of people from the southern Dockyard towns.

In 1941, the RN Church of St Andrew was opened in a Nissen hut within the boundaries of the Dockyard. This temporary building served the needs of the Anglican community until 1969 when the newly built and consecrated St Margaret's Anglican Church was opened. Anglicans of the senior service and others were served by a succession of chaplains at this place which is so familiar to many of us. But like its Episcopalian sister of St Andrew and St George, St Margaret's had a short shelf life as a place of worship. Less than 30 years after it opened it was closed after the Trident fiasco and the withdrawal of the Royal Navy from Rosyth.



Twin strands of worshipping history – Anglican and Episcopalian. Different provinces. The same family of course. Similar liturgies. Similar outlooks. But who might have guessed back in 1995 when closure of the naval base was announced what might have lain in the future? And so for these last 10 years we – Methodists and Episcopalians - have been journeying together. And in that time we *piscies* have been a remarkably stable little flock, when all else in the church and world around us has been shaken. We have welcomed some new members. We have said fond farewells to some of our finest: - to Harry Jenkins and Marjorie Lloyd recently and to others of our own families and friends before them. We have continued to grow and to be inspired by music, by liturgy, by our social gatherings in these buildings – so graciously offered for our use by the Rev Malcolm Trew a decade ago.

And what are the lessons of this history on which we can reflect today? That Rosyth is a pretty volatile place to have a church – the Church of Scotland doesn't need lessons from us about that.

That nothing lasts for ever, that everything changes. That there are times of growth and times of decline. That the fortunes of the churches seem to be tied up with cycles of economic and social growth and decline. That we should rejoice in our church living while we can. That we should focus all our attentions on making this place the best we can. That we should be grateful for our existence to the priests from different places who loved, nurtured and cajoled us in the past: the great 15 years of Father Bone and the 12 years of Colin Preston-Thomas of St Andrew and St George. The chaplains on short tours of duty at the base – the Devonshires, Henleys, Johnsons and Weldons of this world. That we should cherish those who nurture, love and cajole us in the present and look always forward to those who will nurture us in the future.



We celebrate our first 10 years here. And who of us can imagine what the next 10 will bring? For some death, for others new life. For some limitations, for others abundance. For us, will it be decline or growth? For us, will it be the opening of new doors or the sad, final closing of less than a century of ecclesiastical history? I don't know about that. But I do believe that God is faithful. I do believe that from generation to generation God has shepherded his faithful people – through many a day of darkness, through many a day of strife. I do believe that he is leading us even today, even now. He is leading us to new places that we cannot as yet even begin to see or imagine. And I believe that he is good. That the one who called us to walk together on this pilgrimage a decade and more ago is still calling us onwards, still driving us forwards until we reach that glorious destiny that awaits us.

## **Methodist Church Finances**

Below is a summary of the Church finances for the year ending 31 August 2005. At the beginning of that financial year our Church Treasurer, Ron Dempster, was forecasting a deficit in our accounts of some £2400 but you will see from the figures that we ended the year with a significant surplus. This was due to increased income (mainly from collections) and savings in the forecast Property expenditure. Thanks to everyone who helped make this possible. Five months into the financial year the situation is continuing to look healthy and with your continued support it is expected that we will have a surplus again this year. If you are an income tax payer, the Gift Aid scheme is a painless way of increasing the value of the money you give to the Church. John Cowie or Ron Dempster can give you further information about this scheme.

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## **Property Improvement Fund**

There has been a disappointing response to the setting up of the Property Improvement Fund announced in a letter from Deborah in September. The fund was mainly set up to enable us to pay our share of a £47,500 "face lift" proposed for the Church if we were successful in 2 grant applications we were making under the Landfill Tax Credit Scheme. The bad news is that we were not successful with these 2 applications. The good news is that one of the grant making bodies (Biffaward) has encouraged us to re-submit our application if we could satisfy some concerns they had about financial costings and community involvement. The Church Council has agreed that we should re-submit the application and that we should also look at the availability of grants from other organisations which mightl enable us to go ahead with the creation of a new toilet for disabled people and possibly a new rear access for push chairs and wheelchairs. So money is still needed for the Fund and if you can help in any way by making a lump sum donation or regular monthly donations, it would be very much appreciated.



One of the items we had in our grant applications was the replacement of the carpet tiles throughout the Church. These have been in use for 25 years now and in many areas have been showing their age. Recently Paul Ward alerted us to the sale of of a large quantity of carpet tiles by the firm for which he works. We were able to get these at less than a quarter of the normal cost and it was too good an opportunity to miss. Paul has been fitting these for us over the past 2 weeks. There was a limited range of patterns to choose from and limited quantities of each pattern but I hope you will agree that the overall effect has been a brightening up of our

premises. In some instances, there is a bit of a clash between the decor of the rooms and the colour of the carpets but this can be remedied by a fresh coat of paint in due course.

On the subject of painting, last year we had a considerable amount of re-decorating work done both inside and outside the premises. We hope that the same group who did this (Instep Initiatives) will be returning later this year to re-decorate the Church sanctuary.

The next stage of the prayer initiative is to start a Prayer Chain, but more of this in the next Contact.


