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Dear Friends

Its official! Spring is here, the clocks have sprung forward an hour, and the daffodils are beginning to flower and the birds are busy making their nests.

With Spring comes the promise of Easter, resurrection and its promise of new life and new beginnings. But we're not there yet. We are still in the season of Lent – a time of spiritual pilgrimage when Christians throughout history have found time to reflect on the life of Christ and the struggle of his followers.



The first disciples struggled with Jesus' talk of dying, it was all too difficult. This is the part of the Christian calendar that people today still struggle with, still ask questions of, 'Why did he have to die?' 'Could there not have been some other way?' There are plenty of Christians who will prefer to ignore the season of Lent, perhaps celebrating Palm Sunday with singing and praising, shouts of acclamation—then bury their hands in the sand as the Church revisits the Passion of Christ in the days that lead to Easter Day. Holy Week will be avoided, Good Friday is for other people but come Easter Day! Allelulias will once again be sung.

The Christian journey of faith consists of valleys and mountain tops, rough terrain and easy walking, of skipping and dancing, singing and shouting, but also crying, fear and uncertainty, but ultimately hope that the God in whom we move and breathe and have our being travels with us.

The early Church used the season of Lent to teach those new to the faith the story of God as known in and through Jesus Christ. On Easter Day these new Christians would be received into full membership of the Church, and everyone present would remember their own baptismal promises to follow and serve Christ in acts of worship, prayer, learning and caring.

During the days leading up to Easter there will be a number of opportunities to share in worship at Rosyth and reflect on the story of Christ, culminating in the joyous celebration of Easter Day itself. I look forward to sharing this journey with you, and together deepening our knowledge and love of God.

May you know the joy of Christ and the hope of his promise.

The Diocesan Synod 2006


The year is 664 AD. The location is the bleak Yorkshire coast where many centuries later Count Dracula landed on English soil. Troublesome priests are around. The occasion is the **Synod of Whitby**, a seminal event in church history. Roman monks, who had been sent by Gregory the Great to convert the "English" to Christianity, found that missionaries from Ireland observed Easter at a different time from that appointed by the Roman church. After much controversy a synod was held to resolve the difficulty. The Venerable Bede describes the action:-

"Bishop Colman spoke for the Irish, and said: "The Easter I keep I received from my elders. All our forefathers kept it after the same manner, and it is the same which John the Evangelist is recorded to have observed."

Then Wilfrid spoke for the Roman practice: "The Easter which we observe, we saw celebrated at Rome, where the blessed apostles, Peter and Paul, lived, taught, suffered, and were buried - we saw the same in Italy and in France, when we travelled through those countries on pilgrimage. I found that Easter was celebrated at one and the same time in Africa, Asia, Egypt, Greece, and all the world, wherever the Church of Christ is spread abroad, except only among these and their

accomplices in obstinacy, I mean the Picts and the Britons, who foolishly, in these two remote islands of the world, and only in part even of them, oppose all the rest of the universe."

Wilfrid continued: "You sin if, having heard the decree of the apostolic see, of the universal Church, the same confirmed by Holy Writ, you refuse to follow them. Though your fathers were holy, do you think that their small number, in a corner of the remotest island, is to be preferred before the universal Church of Christ? And though that Columba of yours was a holy man, powerful in miracles, should he be preferred before the most blessed prince of the apostles, to whom our Lord said, "Thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. And I will give to thee the keys of the Kingdom of Heaven?"



When Wilfrid had spoken, the king said to the Irish bishop, "Is it true, Colman, that these words were spoken to Peter by our Lord?" He answered, "It is true, O king!" Then said he, "Can you show any such power given to your Columba?" Colman answered, "None." Then, added the king, "Do you both agree that these words were principally directed to Peter, and that the keys of heaven were given to him by our Lord?" They both answered, "We do". Then the king concluded "And I also say unto you, that Peter is the doorkeeper, whom I will not contradict, lest when I come to the gates of the Kingdom of Heaven there should be none to open them." The king having said this, all present, both great and small gave their assent and, renouncing the more imperfect institution, resolved to conform to that which they found to be better."

Would that all synods were so! Debate conducted, arguments put forward, minds convinced, opinions changed. The time for momentous change comes but rarely to these sceptred isles, not so remote now as in Gregory the Great's time. Indeed England - the home of the senior primate of the Anglican Communion - might well do with another Synod of Whitby!

But I digress, because my message is what happened in Perth at our Diocesan Synod on 11 March - the first anniversary of Bishop David's consecration in 2005 - attended by David, Lesley and myself from St Margaret's. The day started with Holy Eucharist in the Cathedral, during which Synod was instituted. Bishop David welcomed folk new to synod and various guests from other churches. As always, we remembered those who have gone on to glory during the year, notable among whom was Canon Ron Leigh, familiar to many of us.

The first formal item was the Adjustment to the Roll of Members, which has reduced from 48 priests to 47. Several folk have retired and there have been one or two new appointments. Canon Bob Fyffe leaves us on appointment as Secretary General of Churches Together in Britain and Ireland, while Kelvin Holdsworth has been appointed as Provost of Glasgow Cathedral. This is probably the first wave of major retirements forecast a couple of years ago. But of note is the upcoming curacy of Tembu Rongong at Holy Trinity Dunfermline.


The Bishop's Address is invariably awaited with bated breath, more so this year as we did not have a sermon during the Eucharist. The following points were made:-

- David summarised his year by saying that it was a steep but short learning curve, during which he had been made to feel very much at home in small but committed communities, full of spirituality, keen to grow and to integrate new ways, both locally and nationally.
- David noted 3 major events, all of some significance to us in Scotland. The first is Lambeth 2008, highlighted because of the problems facing the Anglican Communion - can we find resolution, or are we on a slippery slope? Next, the G8 Conference at Gleneagles which brought together major world leaders - but do they engage in Finally, does the 10th Anniversary of Dunblane give us problem-solving? opportunities for engagement?
- The main substance of David's address was the Review of the Diocese which he initiated shortly after his consecration. The main question to be answered, the basic challenge to be addressed, is "how do we engage with the more fluid, secular society that is Scotland today?" That's where growth and outreach lies.

- David went on to say that the disposition of clergy not quite flying clergy and the balance between clergy and laity, and a year of stewardship, will all be key elements of the way ahead. He saw this as "change as we go", with the occasional concerted effort, and – for this purpose – he intends to set up a working party of clergy and laity. We can't afford to delay, and in particular we can't afford to lose the clarity of the outsider – himself. We should have modest visions, but be vigorous in our commitment.
- David's final point was a few thoughts on our link with the Diocese of Pelotas in Brazil. He is committed to links, but asks if the link with Pelotas has run its course. Can it be revived or renewed? The link is currently under review, and clergy and lay reps have had the opportunity to comment.

The main business of synod is the **Receiving of Reports** from various boards and their pendant committees. The following points are worth highlighting:-

- Regarding finances, and even though the diocese and most charges are a bit strapped for cash, quota is being reduced from 16% to 15½%. This is to promote a message of moving to a position of efficiency, of what we hope to achieve, the start of something bigger.
- Alterations to church buildings is returned to every year. The
 message is that the rules are mandatory, non-negotiable, subject
 to Historic Scotland approval and in accord with Canon 35. Just as
 well we don't have any church buildings at St Margaret's!
- On the Mission and Ministry Board front, 2 committees which are not task-oriented – the Social Responsibility and the Education committees – see a wind of change blowing. Will the diocesan review offer a solution? Will new structures lead to greater efficiency? Will former good practice be lost in the spindrift?



The **Report from the Diocesan Child Protection Officer** invariably generates some emotion, this year producing a suggestion that the requirements of this protocol might be going a bit too far. Bishop David, however, stated that to follow the requirements to the letter was a question of good management, that it must be done right, and that it offered *protection for adults* as much as for children

Elections to Various Responsibilities produced 2 notable appointments:- Canon Val Nellist to the Provincial Board for Episcopal Elections, and the election by his peers of our own David Campbell to be a Canon of St Ninian's Cathedral.



The **Mothers' Union** always amazes by its involvement in our world, ranging from the MUPPET group at Perth Prison – which Charmian Paterson briefed us on some years ago – through work with female prisoners at Cornton Vale, to the invaluable work done through the Contact Centre in Kirkcaldy. Display boards on the subject of domestic violence are in preparation for display in each church, and we were told that NO SMOKING notices will be required from 26 March!!

The one really emotive issue this year came during **Business Notified to Synod.** The very important subject of St Serf's Retirement Home at Tayport was raised by Canon Bob Gillies, who is Chaplain of the Home. A major renovation programme costing some £600K has been completed, funded to a degree by a loan from General Synod Office. But now that the work has been completed, a further period of uncertainty is entered during which 3 options are being floated: maintain the status quo; hand over to a social responsibility landlord; or close the home and sell the property. Needless to say, the final option has raised an uproar around the province at various levels – and it is almost scandalous that such should be contemplated. Thankfully, Bob was able to report one good thing to come out of the refurbishment programme, caused by

relocating some residents to Lane Home in Newport. Weekly services were held at Lane Home while the St Serf's folk where there, but the long-term residents have asked for these services to continue – and this is happening.

Synod had its moments, but overall it was a happy occasion with no great points of contention, and one or two highlights. Alison, Bishop David's wife, helped to serve us all with lunch. There were not too many troublesome priests around - even from Ireland - and ever mindful of the weather, we all got home in time to watch Ireland thrash Scotland!! (a hard fought game with Ireland gaining a narrow victory - Editor)

Methodist Church in Great Britain working with Sia'atoutai Theological College

Here is some news from Marlene Wilkinson, a Mission Partner now working at the Theological College in Tonga. A full up-date from her can be found on the Mission notice board in the crush hall.

What have my first impressions been?

Heat and high humidity – I really struggled with this for the first three weeks, and could barely get anything done. Someone told me that this is the hottest for three years. Fortunately, things have cooled off a little at the moment, especially at night, which at least allows for some reasonable sleep. From about 11 am to 5 pm is still pretty unbearable though, except when the rain storms come, which cool things off but add to the humidity Everything becomes so damp, and I was even drying out the matches with the hair-drier!

Coconuts everywhere. I love the milk from young coconuts

Bells – I live very close to the College bells, and they ring very often and for very long (it seems!), starting at 6 am, except for Wednesdays, Fridays, and Sundays, when they start at 5 am. They ring to wake up the campus, to announce worship (1 hour, and half an hour before, and then at the time of the start), to start each class, and numerous other times to call the students to 'work', choir practice, and things I haven't yet discovered!





Worship —several services. Each morning in the week at either 8 am or 6 am lunch time on Fridays, three services on Sunday. The students gather long before the services start, and sing amazingly. Here is a photo of the College Chapel, with its roof shaped like an upturned canoe.


As for the 'popular image' of Tonga as "full of **palm fringed beaches**" – I have yet to discover those. The campus is 'inland', on the main island

of Tongatapu. (Tonga consists of about 170 islands, though not all are inhabited). I have been taken into Nuku'alofa (the capital of Tonga, and about a 10 minute drive away) a few times for shopping, and have been driven along the coast line there, but that, of course, is not where the best beaches are. It is awesome, though, to see the sea there and realise how very far you need to go before encountering a major land mass.

Sia'atoutai Theologica: College

The students arrived back on 1 Feb, and classes started on 6. I am teaching 4 courses (in English) – 1^{st} year B.D. 'New Testament introduction', 1^{st} year Diploma 'Canon of the New Testament", first and second Year B.D. 'Greek', and 2^{nd} year B.D. 'New Testament Epistles'. There are about 160 students (which is amazing given that the population of the country is only about 100,000). The College is of the main Christian denomination here in Tongan - the Free Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Student life is divided into three main 'parts' – worship, academic work, and physical work (which involves keeping the campus tidy – which is no small task, as it covers quite a big area – and growing fruit and vegetables for the College in the 'bush'). All students and most of the staff live on campus, some with their families, so we have a total campus population of around 600 people. I, too, live on campus, and have a small, but adequate, house with a little bit of a garden. Here is a photo of the back of the house when the



windows were boarded up for the hurricane. One of the students is assigned as my 'house-girl', and she comes to help clean etc.

Tonga is close to the **International Date Line**, and is one of the first group of islands to greet the 'new day'. This struck me particularly on my first Sunday here at worship in the College Chapel – Tonga 'begins' the Sunday Christian Worship which then, little by little, is picked up around the world by the world-wide body of Christians. The worship then 'passes' to my Christian friends in turn, in Australia, East Asia, India, Africa, Europe, Latin America, and North America, and finally reaches my friends in the Canadian Rockies. It makes the part of the hymn "hour by hour fresh lips are making your wondrous doings heard on high" seem very real.

Rosyth Garden City Association


The Association's annual exhibition will be held from Saturday 27 May to Saturday 3 June in
