


Two things are certain:

St Andrews West Area Council Praise Service

The great day finally arrived, when all the Episcopal Churches in the St Andrews West Area met together for Holy Communion in the St Bryce Kirk, Kirkcaldy, on 3 September. There were over 250 in the congregation, from all 11 charges: Aberdour, Burntisland, Dunfermline, Glenrothes, Inverkeithing, Kinghorn, Kinross, Kirkcaldy, Leven, Lochgelly and Rosyth. And each church brought its own Paschal Candle, in fine array behind the Bishop's Throne, lit at the start of the service - and backed by a wonderful cross from Taizé.

The scene was therefore set as the massed choirs sang "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty, the King of Creation!" and the Bishop and Clergy processed to their places. Each congregation was welcomed in turn – to great acclamation – and with many feelings of goodwill, one of the aims of the service! Then, to the singing of "We are one in the Spirit, We are one in the Lord", the young people built a cairn of stones from each church in front of the Altar, symbolising our coming together, and marking the place where we joined in worship. The rector of Kinross, Marion Keston, spoke of the symbolism of cairns to the young people, highlighting that great feeling of reaching a cairn on the top of a mountain, in itself symbolising the efforts of many towards one aim.



The service followed along the familiar lines of the Eucharist, beloved by so many, heightened by beautiful singing from the choir, and ably lead by our new curate, Tembu Rongong – whose amazing voice added to the glory of our worship. The lessons and gospel, from Jeremiah, Ephesians and Matthew, were read by members of the congregation, and our own Trish Heywood, Worldwide President of the Mothers' Union, lead the Intercessions.

In his sermon, Bishop David spoke of the wonderful thing we have done in coming together in this manner, in this old industrial area of Fife, a land of new opportunity and challenge. A land of growth, of new homes, and therefore an area for mission. He said that we often know what we need to do, but then say that it is beyond us. Jeremiah said that the people of Israel were of a similar mind, but that God would enable them to get off their knees. Then why not us?

The offertory hymn was that old favourite of mine "Lord, the light of your love is shining Shine, Jesus, Shine", leading to our Eucharist, when 5 stations were necessary to enable all to make their communion. During communion, the choir sang Stainer's "God so loved the World", followed by music from Taizé, that great Christian community in France. As everyone milled around – order in chaos – there really was an amazing feeling of being one people, in God's service, worshipping together, praising the Lord.

Finally, it all had to come to an end as we sang our Recessional Hymn "Tell out my soul, the greatness of the Lord!", a very fitting end to a wonderful service, one which we must repeat again soon!

Deborah's Ordination

Yes Deborah is now ordained to be a "Minister of the Word and Sacraments in the universal The Ordination Service was held on 25 June at Murrayfield Parish Church of Scotland during the time the Methodist Conference met in Edinburgh. This was one of 8 venues for Ordination Services throughout the City - Central Hall and Nicolson Square Churches being two of the others. Each Service was conducted by the President or a former President of Conference. The service at Murrayfield was led by Rev Graham Carter, the newly elected President for this coming year, assisted by the Vice President of Conference, Deacon Myrtle Poxon. The preacher was Dr Jocelyn Bryan from the Wesley Study Centre, Durham. Deborah was well supported by her family and friends from Saltash and from Rosyth, Kirkcaldy and Granton. Many of the stewards were drawn from the Rosyth and Kirkcaldy congregations and with David Campbell also assisting with the communion it must have seemed almost like a home from home for Deborah. The act of ordination requires the laying on of hands and three people take part in this - the President, a representative of the World Church (in this case Rev Dong-Hwan Kim from Korea) and an Assisting Minister chosen by the ordinand (in Deborah's case, Rev Ian Souter.) It was a very special occasion for Deborah and her fellow ordinands and indeed for all of those who shared in the service.

Hope Builders - Poverty Housing - Let's Nail It

The Methodist Prayer Handbook is a vital tool for being better informed both about the needs and joys of Global Methodism and around the British Districts. For those who already use the handbook you will have noticed that The Scotland District is the focus of prayer on the 30th day of each month and one of the concerns that the district is taking seriously is that of Habitat for Humanity. As part of my professional development as Advocacy Officer for Scotland I need to go and build somewhere.

In addition to the building experience, the fund raising aspect is also part of the professional development and I am responsible for raising some of the cost of this exercise. On **14 October from 4 pm 'til late** there will be **Open House** at 33 Lady Road, Edinburgh EH16 5PA when everyone is invited to come and have some refreshments, meet with friends, make new ones and purchase something from the bring and buy stall. Church Finances

Our Church financial year ended on 31 August and the bad news is that we had a deficit of over £2000. The good news is that this deficit was only because we did not receive the expected Tax Refund in respect of Gift Aid. If this had been received before the end of August as it normally is, we would have had a surplus of over £1800.

Our expenditure in the present financial year will increase significantly. The amount we pay to the Circuit to meet the cost of ministers' salaries etc (known as the Circuit Assessment) has increased by £2600. The other major factor is our fuel bills. Over the last year we have been cushioned from the worst effects of the significant price increases because we were on a 3 year fixed price contract for electricity. That has now come to an end and we will be paying a lot more for electricity in the coming year. This is coupled with a substantial underpayment on our gas bill last year which will have to be paid off this year. The Church's budget for 2006/07 provides for an increase of £1000 in the money received through collections and Gift Day contributions. Please do your bit to help make this happen! Even then a deficit of around £1500 is forecast. (This does not take into account the delayed Tax Refund for 2005/06.)

As most of you will be aware **Ron Dempster** is standing down as Church Treasurer having served 6 years in the post. All who have had dealings with Ron will be aware of the meticulous and conscientious way he has carried out his responsibilities. In some ways the Treasurer's job can be compared to an iceberg with only a small part of the work being visible and an awful lot hidden under the surface. Probably only Mary really appreciates the amount of time which Ron has put into the job. So from everyone in the Church heartfelt and grateful thanks to Ron for all he has done to keep our finances in good order. Being a glutton for punishment Ron has been taking on other responsibilities to fill the gap in his leisure time. He will be taking on responsibility for Gift Aid Work from John Cowie and will also be auditing the books of the Church organisations in future. Between them, Ron and Mary are now looking after the weekly newsletter.

Property Improvements

Last year we submitted two grant applications under the Landfill Tax Credit Scheme to enable us to fund a number of improvements to our Church property. Unfortunately both were turned down. One of the bodies, Biffaward, encouraged us to resubmit the application if we could meet their concerns on three issues they raised.

At the beginning of this year the Church Council decided to continue to seek grants for an amended and slightly reduced package of measures. One of the concerns raised by Biffaward was the absence of community involvement in our plans and it was to meet this concern that we prepared and issued a questionnaire to homes in the local area and to users of the premises. Having carried out that exercise we have now re-submitted our application to Biffaward. This may be in time to be considered at their Trustees meeting in December but it is possible that it will have to wait until March of next year. This application covers the resurfacing of the car park, provision of fencing on the Elder Lea side of the property to form an outside play area, replacement of notice boards, new flooring in the hall and new cupboard accommodation.

The other Landfill Tax application related to the creation of a new back access to the premises through the room next to the kitchen, the creation of a uni-sex toilet for disabled users out of part of the ladies toilet and the complete refurbishment of the ladies and gents toilets. The Church Council decided to drop the idea of refurbishing the toilets and to seek grants for the creation of the new rear access and the toilet for disabled users. This is estimated to cost just over £10000. Applications for grants towards this were made to 3 bodies. As reported in the last Contact the Rosyth Gothenburg Trust awarded us £1000 towards the cost. An application to the Carnegie Dunfermline Trust was turned down but the third application to Awards for All was successful and they awarded us a grant of £7500. Publicity for this grant may appear in the newspapers in a few weeks time. So we have the bulk of the finance in place and the balance will be met by the money in the Property Improvements Fund. Applications for planning permission and a building warrant have been submitted. It is planned to carry out this work in the Spring.

The creation of a new rear access will enable us to close off the existing access through the kitchen and draw up plans for a refurbished kitchen as another phase of our property improvements.

When the Property Improvements Fund was launched the target was £12000 which was to be in addition to monies received through grants. So how are we doing?. The total raised to date is about £5000 of which about half was raised from the special events being held this year to mark the Church's 90th Anniversary. Tax refunds of £330 are expected relating to the personal donations which have been made and St Margaret's have pledged to make a donation. So we can say that we are about half way there. About £1000 of this money has already been spent on new carpet tiles and the fees for planning permission and a building warrant. It is hoped soon to have a visual indicator in the crush hall to show the progress towards the target. Please support the Fund if you can.



Earlier I mentioned the money raised through the 90th Anniversary events and I think it only right that we record our grateful thanks to all those who have helped in the organisation of the events and those who have supported them. The bulk of the work has been undertaken by a small group of ladies and our particular thanks go to them. The 90th Anniversary programme of events is continuing so please support the following events.



Church Parades and All Age Worship

Attendances by our uniformed organisations at Church Parades has been at a low level for some time now. There was a discussion about this among the leaders and Deborah to see what might be done to improve the situation. The outcome was a decision to limit the number of Church Parades per year to three linking in with significant festivals - Harvest, Christmas and Easter. In the week or so prior to the Christmas and Easter Parades, people from the Church would go along to the organisations and take a part in the programme by leading an activity suitable to the age group of the children and young people. The organisations, for their part, would try to arrange an activity after the Parade Services to encourage a larger attendance. The Parades will normally be held on the second Sunday in the month as at present but this may be changed on occasions - to avoid school holidays, for example. In the months when there is no Church Parade, All Age Worship will be held on the second Sunday of the month.

Explorer Scout Sets Sail

Shannon McWilliam, one of our Explorer Scouts, has been selected to be part of a small team sailing aboard the legendary Gypsy Moth IV.
