

Dear Friends



Have you ever watched the egg-timer as the sands begin to fall through ever quicker? That's how I feel at the moment. The sands of time are racing through the narrow neck at a speed quicker than light – my time here is running out and I'm almost at the stage of counting the days. If I break that into Sundays then, as I write this, I only have ten left!

So what of those five years?

Due to the hard work of many, and Martin in particular, the building is no longer the same. The ancillary rooms and worship area have been decorated, new flooring laid, chairs replaced, the kitchen refitted, a toilet with enhanced access has been installed, the car park resurfaced, new notice boards erected and the audio-visual improvements – all have helped to enhance the life and witness opportunities of the congregations.

The two congregations are no longer the same. Some familiar faces have joined the cloud of witnesses, and we miss their presence. Others that have been part of God's story in Rosyth have moved on to pastures new, due to work or family commitments. Then we have been privileged to be part of the journey of faith which has brought new people into membership, either by transfer in or public declaration of faith. There have been twenty eight children for which a service of baptism or blessing has been conducted. Work with our young people and families through Sunday School and Sunday Funday has continued to develop and grow. There are a number of

avenues for adults to grow and develop: training has included the food hygiene, leading, and the pastoral visitors' course. In addition there are a variety of fellowship-groups that meet, including the ecumenical to our newest group in Dalgety Bay.

As congregations together we have enjoyed the fellowship of joint worship, fellowship and social events. Learning and working together in recognition that in Christ we are all one.

Alongside the work of the congregations are all the other activities that take place on the premises: the uniformed organisations, dance groups, Toddlers, Brambles, and Parahandies. Each one is an opportunity for the church to bring the reality of the living Christ to those who do not yet know him.

The life of the church would be impossible without all of you who work quietly behind the scenes, including the stewards, church council, pastoral visitors, and cleaning teams; each person playing their part in God's mission and purpose in this place. You are too numerous to mention by name!

Just as the church and congregation are not the same as five years ago, neither am I. Due to the support, encouragement, friendship and hospitality of so many of you I will leave the area a different person to the one that was welcomed in September 2004.

Life is continually changing and has done since Adam was a boy, and it will continue to change. None of us can stop the sands of time, nor should we want to. My prayer is that when we come back (and we will) there will be familiar things and faces, but more importantly there will be changes and new faces. Things that have begun will be completed and there will be others who have taken up the call and challenge to be children of God and followers of Jesus because of the work and commitment of the congregations of St Margaret's and Rosyth Methodist Church. The one constant factor is the eternal God in whom we live and move and have our being.

Finally, a very big thank you to all of you who have made our time here in Rosyth such a pleasure; I have felt it a privilege to be part of God's story here and to have been called to work with you.


Editorial

THE NEW PASCHAL CANDLE

When you read this, St Margaret's will have its own Paschal Candle stand, which you will have seen in use during the latter part of the Easter Season holding the 2009 Paschal Candle, which represents the Light of Christ in our midst. The new stand replaces the one borrowed for the early part of the season from Holy Trinity Church, Dunfermline.



At the Joint Church Council/Vestry meeting on 21st April, the representatives of our two congregations agreed that it was acceptable to have and to use a Paschal Candle, blessed on Easter Day and lit from the New Fire, and to retain it in the Sanctuary to be lit during those other occasions in the year when it is appropriate for both our congregations to do so, such as Baptisms and Funerals. The Minutes of that meeting state:

"Members were asked for their thoughts in relation to the candle and it was agreed that it should become a permanent feature of both congregation's services."

The candle stand you see was described, with photos, at the meeting, with the comment that the chosen stand not only reflected and complemented the design features of the existing sanctuary furniture, such as the subtle curves of the oak wood, but also that it was a fitting addition to the sanctuary. You will notice that it is about 6" taller than the borrowed stand, representing the importance of the Light of Christ in our lives and worship. I hope you agree that it fits in nicely with what we already have, and that it is a symbol of unity between our two congregations.

Deborah has made use of the Paschal Candle at 2 Baptisms, when the flame was used to light the candle given to the newly-baptized child, again representing for that child and its parents and godparents the Light of Christ.

Strangely enough, we haven't yet agreed how the new candle stand will be paid for. A decision was taken to buy it now – following approval of the meeting - so that it may be used throughout the rest of the year, and to allow the borrowed stand to be returned to Holy Trinity. It may be that someone will want to pay for it outright, so that it may be a memorial to a loved one – and I must admit, that is what I prefer, personally. But we may also decide that the many folk who have indicated that they would like to help to buy the stand is a more appropriate thing to do. Suffice to say, we are very pleased to have our own Paschal Candle and its stand, and all that it represents and means to each one of us.




The Bookcase Number 10




Dalgety Bay House group
