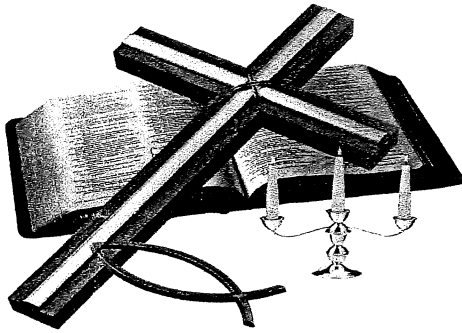

Ministers Message

There is a big and very prominent poster stuck to the wall of one of the churches in Dunfermline which, though I fully appreciate and support the reason it's there, I find rather disturbing.

The poster asks a very simple question: 'Does God exist?'

Possible answers are: 'Yes'; 'No'; 'probably'

Every time I see that poster I can't help muttering under my breath (or, sometimes, if I'm in the car and on my own, actually shouting out loud): 'Don't answer! It's a trick question!'

Of course, it's not meant to be a trick question, but to my mind, it's a meaningless question, or at least one based on a faulty presupposition.

The same question arose in St Andrew's Cathedral, Aberdeen, about 10 year ago at a service to celebrate Bruce Cameron's election as Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church.

In that service, some of the young people of the diocese staged a version of 'Who Wants to be a Millionaire with Bruce as the contestant. He was asked several questions about the Church and his faith which inevitably required him to 'Ask the Audience' or 'Phone a Friend' at various points. Finally he was asked: 'Does God exist?' Bruce thought for a while, and then decided he would ask the audience.

And so, whilst the Who Wants to be Millionaire music blared out in the background, members of the Cathedral congregation, including all the diocesan clergy were asked to give their opinion as to whether or not God existed.

As you might expect, the answer was almost unanimously in favour of God's existence. Only one person had the courage to put his hand up and say that God did not exist - though the fact that he was the Provost of the Cathedral, made his opinion somewhat more noteworthy than it might otherwise have been.

In fact, most people thought he was joking, and laughed. But he wasn't joking. He was deadly serious and though I didn't have the courage to say so at the time, I agree with him. And, if I had a ladder and thought I could get away with it, I might climb up the wall of that Church in Dunfermline with the poster and paint a big red cross in the box next to 'No'! And while I was up there, I would add another question to the poster. Next to 'Does God Exist?', I would add, 'Does God not exist? 'Yes'; 'No'; 'Probably' and again put a cross in the 'No' box.

God neither exists nor does not exist - and the arguments of those like Richard Dawkins and Christopher Hitchens who try to 'prove' that God does not exist are every bit as meaningless as the arguments of Christians who assert that God does exist.

You may well by now be wondering what on earth I'm talking about: How can a Christian Priest think God doesn't exist? Isn't that sheer hypocrisy?

Well, the observant among you will have noticed that I have not said I don't believe in God, I have simply said I don't believe God exists (and neither do I believe God does not exist). My point is that it is simply not appropriate to apply the category or concept of 'existence' to God.

'Existence' is very much a 'this-wordly' category. Existence refers to objects around us, to things we can see or hear; to things we can perceive or experience in the world and in the universe. I exist, an elephant exists; a dodo does not exist, a black hole probably exists.

But none of this applies to God. God is not an 'object' in the material world to be investigated; to be proved or disproved; God can not be the object of rational enquiry or scientific methodology - he just isn't that kind of thing. In fact he's not a 'thing' at all, though when we speak of his existence or non-existence; when we try to prove or disprove it, that's what we reduce him to: a thing; an object.

At best, a god who 'existed' could be nothing more than a 'being' like us. Even if he were the 'supreme being' he would still be a 'being' like us. And surely, for Christians, God is somewhat more than that.

So, the question: 'Does God exist?' simply isn't the right question. Better questions might include: 'What does the word 'God' mean to you?' 'Do you believe and trust in God?' 'Will you choose to be loyal to God?'

The Bookcase No. 11

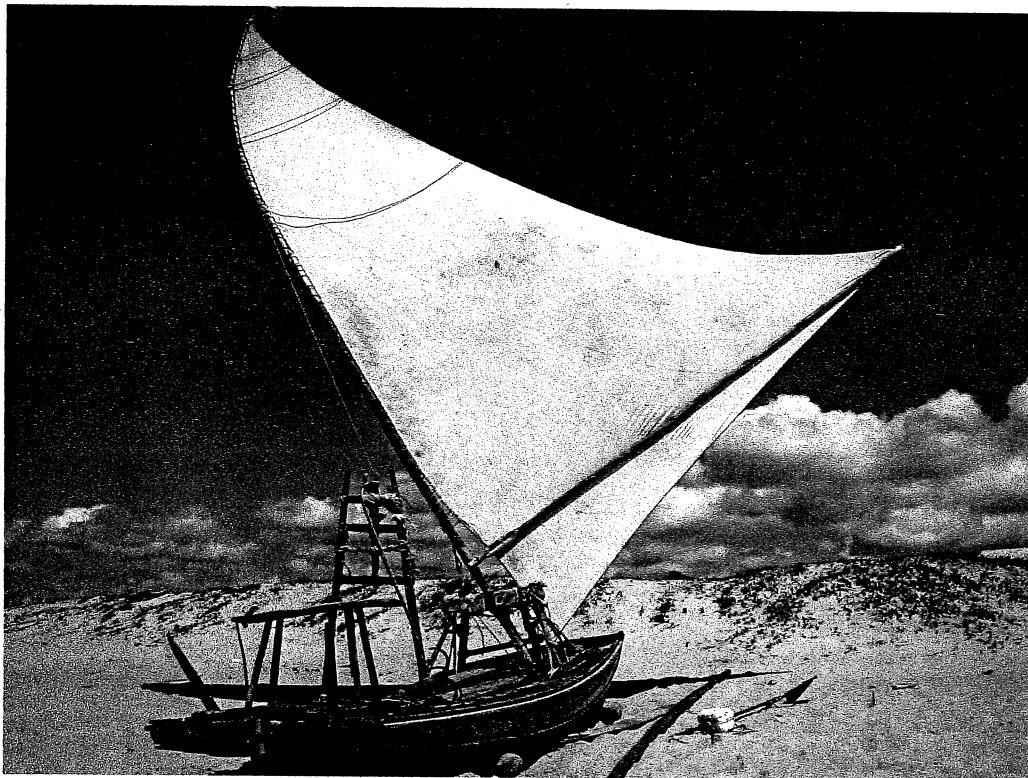
While books and reading are very important to us for many reasons, we do learn a lot through television and very often seeing a film as well as reading the story imprints itself on our minds quite firmly.

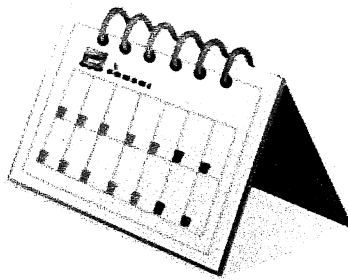

Our New Lecterns

Four years ago I discussed with Dennis Cook possible further alterations to our lectern since it was too high for the majority of our preachers. In the end we agreed that this was not feasible so, in faith, we decided to ask Mr Garland from Pitlessie to make us a new one in keeping with the Welcome Table, the Memorial / Audio Cabinet and the two bookcases he had crafted for us earlier. We wanted it to be height adjustable to suit both short and tall preachers. So we invited an engineer friend of Dennis to design the mechanism to make this possible. Delays occurred through illness, and just as we were ready to contact Mr Garland, we became aware of the possibility that the sophisticated mechanism which had been designed might prove unstable. We couldn't take the risk of it trapping the fingers of any preacher or reader. So we decided it would be safer to purchase a tried and tested gas-height

adjustable one from a firm in Somerset. We were still unsure where the money was coming from.

At this point the Church Council agreed that we could use some money bequested a few years ago, to pay for a lectern. It had been originally suggested that some of this gift could be used to purchase a Good News 'Pulpit Bible', but these were no longer being printed. Then Jack Fowell discovered that Granton Methodist Church had two such Bibles, and was willing to donate one of them to us. This enabled us to order two matching lecterns with built-in microphones and lights, one for the preacher and one for the Bible.

The order was placed on 24th December 2008. Then we waited and waited, and finally they arrived - one week before Deborah's last service with us. How's that for timing! They were dedicated by her on 26th July, and Jack read from the 'new' pulpit Bible from Psalm 119: 97 - 105 which includes the well known words "Your word is a lamp to guide me and a lamp for my path".

Jack is brother-in-law to Betty Anderson who left the legacy which has been used to purchase the lecterns. Betty was active for many years in our church before she transferred her membership back to Plymouth Central Hall in December 1993. How grateful we are for people like Betty whose generous gifts enable beautiful and useful items to be placed in our church. It is pleasing that the decorated "fall" donated in November 1999 in memory of a former Circuit and Senior Church steward, and which used to hang from the pulpit, now hangs from the Bible lectern.

The Church Council will be asked on 15th September to allow our heavy font to be moved so that one of the lecterns can stand on more even flooring, in its place. The old lectern is being modified to make a smaller table-top lectern to be used by speakers in the lounge.

Rosyth Methodist Church – Arrangements after Deborah's departure

As many of you are aware, following Deborah's move to Ledbury in August, there will be no full-time minister for Rosyth and Kirkcaldy Churches. This will be the case for at least the following 12 months.

Arrangements have been made with support from the Circuit Superintendent and the Circuit Office to make sure that all aspects of our worship, pastoral care and administration here in Rosyth are tended to. These are detailed as follows.

Worship – The existing Circuit Plan will continue in its current form. The Senior Steward will liaise with the Superintendent during the Plan preparation each quarter to make notification of any special services or alternative arrangements required for a given Sunday during that quarter. The Joint Holy Communion service will continue to be shared with St Margarets on the 4th Sunday of each month. These will be led by Tim Bennison and Methodist Ministers on a similar basis to that currently

experienced. The Sunday Funday will move to the 2nd Sunday in the month and will be followed by the existing 'All-age' Worship. All other services will continue to be led by Local Preachers from the Circuit.

Additional services such as weddings, funerals and baptisms outside normal services will be led by a minister from the Circuit.

Eric Potts will be the Presbyter with Oversight (Minister) for Rosyth. Eric has volunteered to provide up to 10 hours per week in this role. There may however also be some obligation by Eric towards Kirkcaldy and we will therefore be flexible depending on specific needs, eg if he is required to preside over a funeral there will be a certain amount of preparation and organising time over and above the actual service itself which will restrict the availability of Eric during that week for other matters.

Pastoral Care – This will continue to be provided by the Pastoral Visitors. Additional to their existing role, some Visitors have volunteered to administer Holy Communion using reserved sacrament to housebound or hospitalised members of the congregation. Anyone requesting this or any other pastoral need should in the first instance speak to their own Visitor or to the Pastoral Secretary Gwyneth Kirby (01383 624779). Only in need of emergency pastoral support, eg bereavement, should Eric be contacted directly.

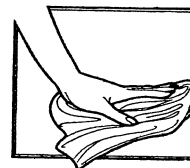
Administration – The Church Council and its sub-committees will continue to be the primary administrative body of the Church. It is a requirement that the main Council is chaired by a serving Minister so initially this will be performed by the Superintendent, Andrew Letby. Going forward this role may be assumed by Eric. Enquiries or concerns on subjects such as hall lettings, finance, Church Council, general property matters will continue to be addressed by those with existing responsibility, eg Howard Kirby for finance, Martin Rogers for hall lettings, property and John Cowie for Church Council business. For all other matters or general enquiries, the initial point of contact will be either the Senior Steward (David Salthouse 01383 889212) or the Circuit Office (0131 221 9029). Except as mentioned above, contact should not be directed to Eric.

Future Ministerial staffing position – The Circuit is currently undergoing a review of its existing and future resourcing position. Discussions and review meetings have been ongoing between Ministers, Gary Williams (District Learning and Development Officer) and congregations to understand the needs and expectations of the Circuit members. The report of the meetings is due in September which will detail proposals for the future of this Circuit. Until this report is presented it is un-clear what the proposed future support for Rosyth will be. Once the report is available we will have a better understanding of the future which we can all help to shape going forward. At the end of September the Circuit will make known its staffing request for 2010.

Help with Property Maintenance

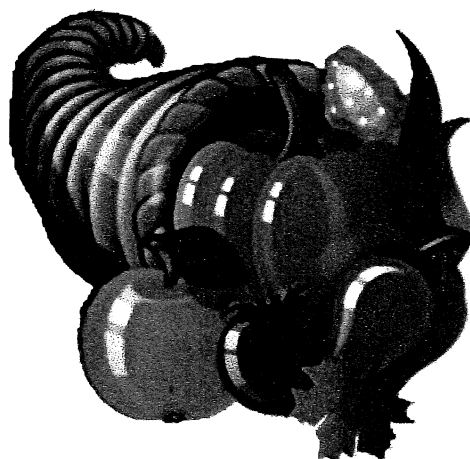

Benevolence Fund – a fresh look

What is the Benevolence Fund all about, and how should we apply it? Uncertainty about this led the Church Council recently to determine on a fresh approach.

Formally, the fund is defined as “money collected for the specific purpose of relieving poverty and distress.” Many years ago it used to be called the Poor Fund. In the days when there was no such help as the present day National Health Service, Social Security Benefits or Pensions, the 'Poor Fund' was used to help people who were truly destitute, by for example buying food.

Times have moved on. It is not that “people who are truly destitute” are no longer with us, but that the church’s role in doing something about it has become less obvious. But the fund remains, with changed name but unchanged intent: and the reason for this is that *the relief of poverty and distress is one of the purposes of the local church*. The fund is to be applied primarily for the relief of poverty and distress “in the congregation and neighbourhood”. Whilst payments may, as in times past, be made at the confidential discretion of the minister, the Church Council has authority to adopt and implement a scheme for its distribution.

Hence the Council will now be identifying each year a charitable organisation whose principal purpose is the relief of either poverty or distress, and distributing to it some or all of the funds received into the Benevolence Fund. In 2009 the charity helped in this way has been the Dunfermline Samaritans, through the August retiring collection. For the future, the Council has decided to set up a small working group, to review with the aid of expertise from other organisations what types of poverty and distress exist in the neighbourhood, and thence to determine what gaps in meeting those needs might best be filled by the Methodist Church, perhaps in association with others.
