

A visit to Israel

Anna Wareing went on a visit to Israel which was organised between the Amos Trust and the Methodist Children and Youth Department. She writes about her experience.

I have never been so glad that I jumped at the opportunity of going on a trip in my life. Going to Palestine/ Israel was so immensely eye opening, heart breaking and inspiring. For me the most powerful memories are those where we talked to people, young and old, who in amongst utter disaster and injustice were talking so passionately about the positives and ways in which they work for peace. For example, we visited a theatre group, run by an outstanding lady whose key aims are to bring social change and the empowerment of young people by use of music, drama, dance, life and colour.

We went to non-violence training where The Holy Land Trust works in political and social ways without violence to achieve their goals. They demonstrate, go against social strategies, sing, dance and use political interference instead of fighting. We also visited an incredible place called Tent of Nations. Here, one family's land is under threat of demolition and in response to this they do not run away, they stay and seek to build bridges of understanding, reconciliation and peace. They facilitate

conversations between young people living in conflict and help prepare young people for a good future and teach them about true belonging to their country. They want to help the young people of today gain principles of understanding and tolerance.

After coming home, all I think about is the strength, courage and passion of these people who I will remember for the rest of my life. They believe peace can come from faith, hope and love and that we should never give up hope. They are the most outstanding people I know. I think if I was living in their situation I would have ran away out of fear, anger and sadness. Yet these wonderful and inspirational people stay strong and work against the horrendous amount of injustice in creative and highly positive ways. I cannot begin to imagine how it must feel to not be able to walk wherever you please, not be able to drink and use water whenever you need to or not be allowed to create a home wherever you want. I think to live in a place where this is the case and vet to be as strong and proactive as they are deserves all the respect in the world.

St Teresa of Avila describes what it means to be part of the 'Army of God':

Christ has no body now but yours,
No hands but yours,
No feet but yours,
Only through your hands
can Christ reach out to the world
Only on your feet
can Christ walk about to do God's good.
Only through your eyes
can Christ's compassion look out on the world,
Yours are the hands,
Yours are the feet
Yours are the eyes,
You are Christ's Body.
Christ has no body in this world but yours.

Haiti Help News

In 2009, three nurses from Fife, Carole Hatten, Lou Davidson and Elaine Stark, volunteered to go to La Gonâve in Haiti to immunise children. Although they were expecting to see poverty, they were shocked at the deprived conditions, particularly in the local children's home. They formed 'Haiti Help' to try to raise enough money to make a difference!

'Haiti Help' is pleased to be working with Okipe, a non-profit co-operative which co-ordinates the efforts of charities working together to improve conditions for the children. Okipe is facilitating the building of a 'Children's Village' to feed, educate and care for 80 children initially and for 150 children in the longer term.

In March this year the nurses made their fourth visit to La Gonâve. The children's home now cares for 75 children, though conditions there are still poor. In the Wednesday Fellowship here, and within the church, we have been interested in the development of the project and as well as giving money, we collected new clothing for the children which the nurses were able to take out within their luggage allowance. This year they were able to leave money to renew the mosquito netting on the windows and to buy a bed and bedding. Shoes are also a necessity. Each year Lou comes to give us an excellent update with a PowerPoint presentation; we hope she is able to come and see us later in the year.

Another way of fundraising locally is through the sale of books, hard-back and paperbacks in good condition. There is a point of sale in the Surgery at Charlestown where Lou works. If you have any books you wish to 'pass on', please let me know.

May I renew my thanks for all your help, gifts and prayers in the past, and my hope that you will continue to support this good work in this tragedy-struck country.

Gwennap Pit, a special place

Dorothy Wilson makes regular trips to Cornwall to stay with her cousins who live in a village between St Ives and Penzance. She arranged to go from 19 June to 10 July, and then made the discovery that during that time our Minister, Sarah, was to be received into full membership of the Methodist Diaconal Order. She would be given a blessing and a large Diaconal cross. The Special Service was to be held at the Gwennap Pit which wasn't far from where she was staying. Dorothy decided that she would like to be there, so she spoke to Sarah who offered to get her three tickets. You had to produce tickets to get admitted.

Gwennap Pit is an amphitheatre better known as John Wesley's Amphitheatre. He first went there in 1762 and described it as 'a green hollow'. By the time he was 86 years old he had visited Gwennap Pit 18 times.

A group of Mine Captains remodelled it as a permanent memorial to John Wesley.

On 1 July, Dorothy and her cousins set off to get there in plenty of time for 5.00pm. As they entered they were each given a nice gift bag which contained a bottle of water, a plastic poncho, a box with a Cornish pasty, a scone, a small jar of jam and a pot of Cornish cream. The cream had been provided by Rodda's Creamery, a well-known business in that area. There was also a plastic bag for the rubbish!

As well as meeting up with Sarah and her husband Archie, Dorothy had a chat with our previous Minister Deborah and her husband John.

Unfortunately, just as the Communion Service started, the rain came on so the ponchos were put to good use.

Dorothy said that it was a great experience, and she will remember it in years to come.

We're delighted that a visit to Rosyth has been included in their 6th UK tour, and that musical director Jurij Maruk will lead the ensemble on **Tuesday 13 November** at 7.30pm at Rosyth Methodist Church.

The Buzzard, the Bat, and the Bumblebee

The Buzzard

If you put a buzzard in a pen that is 6 feet by 8 feet and is entirely open at the top, the bird, in spite of its ability to fly, will be an absolute prisoner. The reason is that a buzzard always begins a flight from the ground with a run of 10 to 12 feet. Without space to run, as is its habit, it will not even attempt to fly, but will remain a prisoner for life in a small jail with no top.

The Bat

The ordinary bat that flies around at night, a remarkable nimble creature in the air, cannot take off from a level place. If it is placed on the floor or flat ground, all it can do is shuffle about helplessly and, no doubt, painfully, until it reaches some slight elevation from which it can throw itself into the air. Then, at once, it takes off like a flash.

The Bumblebee

A bumblebee, if dropped into an open tumbler, will be there until it dies, unless it is taken out. It never sees the means of escape at the top, but persists in trying to find some way out through the sides near the bottom. It will seek a way where none exists, until it completely destroys itself.

Torchbearers for Christ

One of the functions of the committee that plan the games is to choose the individuals who will carry the Olympic Torch, the 'torchbearers'.

Individuals chosen to carry the torch are people of accomplishment. They are individuals that the host country is proud to show off. Torchbearers are people that others would want to emulate, they are role models. It is a great honour to be chosen to carry the Olympic Torch.

As Christians, we are called to be torchbearers. A torchbearer is a person who leads or inspires. We are to carry the torch which, according to the Oxford Dictionary, is something that is lit for illumination. Jesus is the light of the world and we are to carry Him wherever we go. As His children, we are to shine so that those who do not know Him may come to know Him.

Singing the Faith was published a year ago on 14 September. This collection of 840 hymns and songs would take an estimated forty hours to sing from beginning to end! Peter Brophy, who was Editor-in-Chief, said: "Having completed the editorial tasks for Singing the Faith it was first of all a delight to handle the published book – all those scraps of paper, urgent emails and even more urgent phone calls now transformed into a hymnbook – a physical testament to the dedicated volunteers who worked for a Biblical seven years to bring it to fruition.

"But it has been even more of a delight to visit Methodist churches from Cornwall to Berwick-on-Tweed and from London to Lancashire during the last twelve months and be handed a copy of 'our new hymnbook' by the steward at the entrance, and then to join in worship, whether traditional or modern, using what I truly believe is a precious resource given to us by God."

"This beautifully presented hymn book is transforming worship through the sheer diversity of the hymns and songs contained within its pages," said the Rev Dr Mark Wakelin, President of the Methodist Conference. "Singing the Faith is the one hymn and song book you have to have."

The Rev Barbara Bircumshaw, Chair of the Music Resources Group which was responsible for producing the collection, said: "I am thrilled by the success of *Singing the Faith*. It's great that it is being widely used by congregations around the Connexion – more than I ever dreamed possible. And it's very humbling to have played a part in bringing *Singing the Faith* to birth!
